



2010 Poverty Fact Sheet

What is the face of poverty in Travis County?

In 2008, one in seven Travis County residents or 144,336 people were living below the federal poverty level of \$21,200 for a family of four. The Travis County poverty rate (15%) is higher than the U.S. rate (13%) but lower than the Texas rate (16%).

In 2008 in Travis County:

- 19% of children and youth (47,723 persons under the age of 18) were living in poverty
- 16% of women (76,632 persons) were living in poverty
- Nearly 8% of all elderly individuals (4,732 persons) were living in poverty
- 24% percent of all individuals with a disability (17,788 persons) were living in poverty
- 29% of adults without a high school diploma (24,985 persons) were living in poverty

Did you know?

Most families living in poverty (84% or 19,447 families) do not receive any type of cash assistance from the government.

72% of households living in poverty (36,587 households) did not receive food stamps.

What does it really take to get by?

The federal poverty level does not tell the story of those who are struggling to meet their basic needs. Most researchers and policymakers agree that a family must earn at least two times the federal poverty level to meet basic needs. A family is considered to be low-income if they earn 200% of the federal poverty level or \$42,400 for a family of four. This paints a different picture of economic instability in Travis County. Under this definition in 2008:

- Approximately one in three residents (311,005 persons) were low-income.
- 41% of children and youth under the age of 18 (101,504 persons under the age of 18) were low-income.
- One in five older adults or 12,082 persons 65 years or older were low-income.

Poverty has many tangible costs for our community:

- Loss of human potential and productivity
- Reduction of workforce readiness and economic competitiveness
- Higher health insurance premiums and doctor bills
- Increased crime and the rising cost of prisons
- Exacerbation of racial divisions
- Family instability and breakup

When should I get involved? Now!

The recent economic downturn has exacerbated the problem of poverty throughout the nation and has pushed many families over the edge into an unstable economic condition. Local agencies are struggling to help our neighbors in poverty meet their basic needs.

In 2008, the United Way Capital Area centralized referral and information system, 2-1-1 Texas, experienced a 40% increase in the number of calls received for basic needs assistance in Central Texas. This increase in demand was most significant in the areas of food (+34%), housing (+25%), and transportation (+20%).

In 2008, Austin Energy received 8,578 requests for utility assistance, a 41% increase from 2007. In spite of Austin Energy's assistance and other efforts, service was disconnected for non-payment of utility bills in an average of 4,100 households per month during 2008, compared with an average of 3,950 per month during 2007.
